Spring 1: Learning opportunities: Wonderful Weather

<p>Practise the spellings on the sheet that is sent home each week. It is up to you how you choose to do this.</p> <p>You could make words in a tray of flour, write rainbow words with different coloured pens, hide words on post it notes for your child to find and copy down to create their spelling list. Share your fab ideas with others.</p>	<p>Practise your addition and subtraction skills (within 20). You may choose to do this with sweets, toys or pasta.</p> <p>Practise writing your teen numbers.</p> <p>Find a 3D shape. How many vertices, edges and faces do they have?</p>	<p>Listen to a weather report and have a go at writing your own.</p> <p>Draw a picture of your favourite weather and label the parts of your picture.</p> <p>Find out and write about an extreme weather event and then share it with your class.</p>	<p>Encourage your child to read regularly at home. Support them with their reading by asking questions about what they have read. Please make a note of each reading session in your child's reading record book.</p> <p>Visit your local library and find a fiction or non-fiction book about the weather.</p>	<p>Visit the Oxford Owl website and complete your weekly reading tasks. Numbots will support the maths we have covered in class too. You will find your log in details inside your reading record.</p> <p>Visit Purple Mash and play Weather Map to create your own weather map using the symbols. You will find your log in details inside your reading record.</p>

Here are some ideas if you wish to carry on your learning at home:

- Keep a daily diary of the weather where you live.
- Collect rain in different containers. Which one fills up first? Why does this happen?
- Take pictures of the different weather you see.
- Draw a picture of yourself dressed in the different clothes you would wear for different types of weather.
- Design and make your own weather symbols.
- If you know a relative who lives in a different part of the country, message them to find out about the weather there. Is it the same as Ilkley?
